Talking Points that Emerged from Abbreviated Iowa Meeting in February:

- Innovation in pedagogy and technology, with discussion of the “flipped classroom” model of instruction: <http://www.knewton.com/flipped-classroom/>
- Sustained instruction as a means to provide for shared teaching of Less Commonly Taught Languages (LCTLs)
- Building a sustained course of study in LCTLs, which would include upper division courses and emphasize proficiency standards
- Close examination of study abroad as a mode of collaboration, concentrating on curricula related to orientation and re-entry
- Languages that might hold the most potential for cooperative work are Swahili, Portuguese, Korean, Chinese, Arabic, Hindi, and Marathi
- A virtual exchange of teaching and/or testing materials could be created, i.e., “Materials Share.”

Wayne Jacobson, Director of Assessment in the Office of the Provost at the University of Iowa and an adjunct Faculty in Educational Policy and Leadership Studies, is serving as our official workshop reporter; don't hesitate to avail yourself of the opportunity to talk with him about your interests and concerns!

Wayne spent the first half of his academic career teaching ESL in the U.S. and Southeast Asia, and he has consulted on program design, staff development, and assessment for language and literacy programs in Malaysia, Indonesia, Vietnam, China, and the U.S. Before coming to Iowa, he was Director of the Center for Instructional Development and Research at the University of Washington. He holds a Ph.D. in Adult Education from the University of Wisconsin - Madison.

At Iowa, he is responsible for coordinating learning outcomes assessment in academic programs at UI, and he is also involved in preparing for UI's next institutional accreditation, UI participation in national assessment initiatives, and assessment collaborations with other CIC and Iowa Regents universities.

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
